That idea of something beautiful that means something is right at the heart of all that we do at Chapel FM. That's why we have a Theory of Change for Chapel FM (see pages 03-04). Indeed 'creativity with purpose' has been the byline of community arts company - Heads Together Productions - which is behind Chapel FM, ELFM and many other creative endeavours.

As we celebrate the second birthday of Chapel FM we are also recognising thirty years of purposeful creative activities with Heads Together.

Many people are part of our journey. If you look closely inside the big blue waveform in the Chapel FM windows there are a couple of hundred other mini waveforms etched onto the glass. Those are some of the people who have been part of the Chapel FM journey. 'Audio signatures' from volunteers, young people, members of the Methodist congregation, funders, the builders, our neighbours... lots of people who helped make Chapel FM happen.

Ten thousand people visited Chapel FM last year. Lots of local people (64% of visitors) and lots of young people (41% of all participants were under 18). We've presented a whole host of statistics on Page 10 to give you an idea of the scale of work that has gone on at Chapel FM.

Background

We worked on the theory of change with support from consultant Liz Firth and the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation. It has enabled us to have a real context to our work at Chapel FM. The project is a collaboration between the Donut venues as a consortium and researchers from the Schools of English, Performance and Cultural Industries, and Geography at the University of Leeds.

A Collective Vision

To achieve our vision of change we need to team up with like-minded people and organisations. We have a whole range of one-on-one partnerships but here we highlight a few areas where we are involved in bringing together collectives of people striving towards similar goals.

SEACROFT WORKING TOGETHER

There is a really good spirit of collaboration between individuals and organisations up in Seacroft. There is a formally constituted neighbourhood forum that began it's work in earnest in 2015, tasked with coming up with a vision for Seacroft, which will eventually be put to a local referendum. The Neighbourhood Improvement Group also links the various statutory bodies and voluntary organisations in the area aiming to coordinate activity around particular themes.

And then, as well as the fabulous Seacroft summer and winter galas, there were a whole range of summer events in the parks and green spaces - we plan to get even more involved next year with our Chapel on Wheels initiative



WELL GOOD

We are involved in a range of initiatives to help promote mental well-being and to support people of all ages who have mental health issues.

That includes programming around our own No Bystanders theme and being involved in city-wide initiatives like the Love Arts festival. We have also introduced specific opportunities, like our Find Your Frequency course, that can be tailored to people's individual needs and all our staff have been trained in Mental Health First Aid techniques.

But we want to learn from others as well and we were involved in creating the Well Good network of community arts organisations in Yorkshire who have a focus on well-being with support from the IGEN Trust. Sharing experience, professional development opportunities and providing safe performance opportunities - we were only too happy to host music trainees at Chapel FM as well as support festivals at Tang Hall Smart in York and Orb Arts in Knaresborough...





MUSIC.LEEDS.US

We have worked closely with the vibrant 'music scene' in Leeds over many years and our Next Gen Music and Associate **Bands** courses introduce teenage musicians to the different parts of that scene-from promoters to venues to producers to music lawyers..

Music.Leeds.Us. is an initiative we are developing with a range of partners across the city including Leeds Museum to document the history of popular music in Leeds over the last 50 years.



THE DONUT GROUP

There are many arts organisations and venues in Leeds - that's one of the reasons there is such a groundswell towards Leeds' bid to become European Capital of Culture in 2023, a bid which Chapel FM is proud to support.

But coming from those discussions, we realised that there are some venues that we have more in common with than others. That's how the Donut group came into being – a network of arts venues that are situated outside of the city centre and are unashamedly dedicated to the communities they are based in;

TANDEM PARTNERSHIP

As it says in our Theory of Change we believe in connecting nationally and internationally to build creativity with purpose. Exchange programmes with organisations in Newcastle, Belfast, Paris and Japan have had an enormous impact on some of the young people we work with

The **Tandem** exchange project is a fantastic opportunity, linking similar organisations internationally and offering opportunities for exchange projects in the future. Chapel FM is part of the 2016/17 Tandem programme for community and participatory arts organisations. We are part of a network of 14 organisations from the Netherlands, Belgium, Germany and the UK and are partnered up up with ZIMIHC - a beautiful venue supporting voluntary arts in Utrecht.

We will be hosting a visit of all fourteen organisations in February 2017 and undertaking a creative exchange with **ZIMIHC** in the summer.

Associate Bands

If there are two things that I can take away from the Associate Bands Programme over these past two years they are that the average Tweet only lasts 12 minutes before it's lost in an endless sea of retweeted memes; and that the music industry is so much bigger than any preconceptions would have led me to believe. What the AB programme has given me is so much information and understanding - from discussing global success and contacts in Leeds with singer-songwriter Dan Pearson to developing song-writing and stagecraft with Carnabells' Luke Thompson.

Apart from that I have had various opportunities to play at highly regarded venues around Leeds, such as Belgrave Music Hall and The Tetley, with other like-minded musicians. I was also introduced to Arts Awards, a similar concept to the Duke of Edinburgh Award but this way I was much less likely to get my hair wet! Part of the qualification is to host your own event, leading to 10 Associate Band members organising, selfpromoting and performing an amazing gig at the Brudenell Social Club, one of the most respected music venues in Leeds; as well as the opportunity to host my own Open Mic night, simultaneously helping build confidence and communication skills. What I loved most about the Associate bands programme is the confidence it has given me to write more, laugh more and play music more. I don't think that without it I would be moving onto recording my own music, as I am today, and moving forward in my quest to conquer the Leeds music scene... whatever that is!

Chapel FM -**My Happy Place** by Jess Holmes

In 2012 I came across this radio station called ELFM (now Chapel FM) and really didn't know what to expect as a loud but anxious 12 year old girl who never really put herself out there. Four years later I've done so many things

- writing songs and performing them on live radio; interviewing; acting in performances; even going camping and achieving my Bronze and Silver Arts Award—things I never thought a radio station would offer me.

It's been a huge part of my younger teenage years, helping my confidence and allowing me to meet incredible people who I now consider my really good friends. I'm 17 now and am part of the Chapel FM Graduates group, which allows me to have more of a decisionmaking role in Chapel FM events, and I have also arranged to have work experience in a few months time.

Interviewing on the radio has to be one of my proudest achievements. It's something I never thought I would ever get the chance to do and it's pretty cool telling people that you've been on the radio.

It's extra things you do outside the education system like at Chapel FM that can really make a difference on things like getting into college or even a job. And if you get your Arts Award then you get a certificate that proves what you have achieved (they certainly were very impressed when I brought out my certificates at my college interview!) You demonstrate a range of skills — everything from taking part to showing leadership — and it looks amazing on CVs and personal statements. If you have a passion in the arts, these awards are really something to consider.

Last year I was involved with the No Bystanders festival that Chapel FM organised. A few of us wrote some songs for an EP, which raised money for the Ann Maguire Arts Education Fund (in memory of the teacher who was killed). Having fun whilst doing something great for a good cause is not something that happens regularly but Chapel FM has always offered these type of things.

I consider Chapel FM to be my happy place - doing the things I enjoy, with my friends, which benefit my future. I am forever thankful that it exists.

Poetry Factor

Untouched by Holly Atkinson

I started with Chapel FM back in 2010 on the Next Generation foundation course where we spent a week trying out music, broadcasting and songwriting.

Since then I have developed my confidence massively, been given the opportunity to travel to Japan, playing music at festivals, broadcasting and now helping teach on the next gen music course.

I've just finished studying photography and English at York college, and have decided to move to Leeds College of Art and do a foundation course in art.

The course is only two weeks in and already it's proving to be a great choice. I'm hoping to begin producing more artwork for exhibiting and through studying at LCA, I have the option to experiment with the types of artwork and challenge myself with concepts.



The 'untouched' series of photographs were a few from my most recent photography project; I shot most of them in Leeds, Scarborough and Cleethorpes. The aim was to push myself into not relying on post editing to improve the shots, instead I wanted to present a series of photographs that told stories, showed mundane and often little moments that go unnoticed whilst also presenting the moment as it was.
